MVR/DRIVER GUIDELINES

General Rule:

- Acceptable drivers have MVRs that meet the following guidelines:
 - The driver has no Major violations within the last five (5) years; and
 - b. The driver does not exceed any of the following guidelines:
 - 1) Two Minor violations and no At-Fault accidents in the past three years; or
 - 2) One At-Fault accident and one Minor violation in the past three years
 - 3) Three not At-Fault accidents in five years

Not Acceptable:

- Four or more Minor violations in 3 years, or
- One Major violation and 2 or more Minor violations in 5 years or
- c. 2 or more at fault accidents and any type of moving violation in the last 3 years, or
- d. 3 or more at fault accidents in the last 5 years.

Violations Overview:

When an accident and a violation occur on the same date it is considered 1 occurrence and only the most serious offense should be considered.

MAJOR violations consist of violations that fall into one of the following general categories:

- Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs including implied consent.
- b. Driving without owners consent.
- c. Failure to obey or eluding an officer.
- Falsifying an accident report.
- e. Failure to report an accident.
- A felony involving a motor vehicle.
- g. Failure to stop or leaving the scene of an accident.
- Intoxicants or drugs in a vehicle.
- Larceny involving a motor vehicle.
- Operating with no license or a suspended or revoked license.
- Racing or exhibition driving.
- Reckless driving or operating without regard to safety.
- m. Unlawful use of a drivers license.
- vehicular manslaughter, homicide, or assault.
- o. Speeding in Excess of 20 or more miles over the posted speed limit.
- Careless and/or imprudent driving.

MINOR violations consist of all moving violations except those that are defined as Major violations.

NOTE: The failure to fasten safety belt and the child safety restraint violation are not considered moving violations.
